It's official!

The Highland Community College Hospitality Management program, inspired by Swift Hospitality Group, is underway, with an instructor hired and new classes ready to go for the fall 2015 semester in August.

The instructor and program coordinator will be Evan Talbert, an experienced hospitality and culinary professional. Four new classes will be offered this fall as part of the Associate of Applied Science two-year degree: Intro to Hospitality, Supervision/HR, Front Desk Management and Housekeeping/Room Division.

Local businesses, individual donors, a grant from the Carlson Hotel group, and a significant pledge from the Swift Hospitality Group, generated more than \$81,000 and allowed Highland Community College to give a green light to Hospitality Management.

Support for second year funding, estimated to be \$100,000, will be sought again from private donors and hospitalityrelated businesses. Highland estimates that the program will be selffunding by year three, with tuition revenue and state reimbursement covering most of the operational costs.

Swartz Family Bequest Benefits Lifelong Learning

recent bequest to the Foundation captures the importance that Highland Community College has had for one local family.

Before Helyn Swartz passed away recently, she had requested that a donation be made to the HCC Foundation in her memory because her four children all experienced education at Highland College.

Also, Helyn herself loved participating in classes & activities at Highland. She loved learning, was a writer, a dancer, took exercise and dance classes, and conducted Rules of the Road training classes for seniors on behalf of the Secretary of State's office. Helyn's daughter Sharon said that she was always talking about her involvement at HCC, and she found the activities very energizing and stimulating.

The oldest Swartz family child, Kathleen Swartz Gummow, who graduated from Freeport High School in 1961, was the first enrollee in Freeport Community College when Dean Hargett arrived to open the College. Since FCC did not have a separate campus, classes were held in the high school building, starting at 4 pm and ending at 10 pm. Kathie worked full time and attended part time, graduating in the second class. She graduated from Michigan State University (MSU) in 1966 with a degree in Microbiology.

Daughter Sharon Keenan (who provided most of this background information) graduated from Freeport High in 1964 and attended FCC on a scholarship, when Burton Brackney was dean. She worked part time in the Student Personnel Services office. She was President of the Board of Student Directors her sophomore year, and graduated Phi Theta Kappa with high honors in 1966. She also graduated from MSU in 1968 with a degree in English.

Brother Bruce K. Swartz, Jr. graduated from Freeport High in 1966. He was in the first graduating class from Highland Community College. He currently owns businesses in Rockford and Rockton. Another brother Brian Swartz, now deceased, graduated from Freeport High in 1971 and entered the HCC Tool and Die program operated in conjunction with Micro Switch, division of Honeywell. He earned his certification from HCC and was head of the model shop at Micro/ Honeywell at the time of his death in 2004.

Sharon Swartz says, "You can see how important your institution has been to the Swartz family. We all benefitted from the educational and career opportunities provided by the local community college."

She added, "We appreciate that her bequest will benefit the Lifelong Learning community outreach program that you are striving to reinstate."

Tim Hood, who assumed the Highland College presidency July 1, has indicated that one of his major goals is to re-establish the Lifelong Learning program at Highland Community College.
