HCC Foundation Announces April 1 Scholarship Deadline

pril 1 is the deadline for submitting Highland Community College Foundation scholarship applications, according to Pat Dunn, Highland Foundation director of operations and member of the HCC Scholarship Committee.

A searchable database of more than 100 scholarships is available at highland.edu. This online tool allows Highland students to review scholarships based on eligibility criteria. Students seeking additional information on the application process should call the Foundation office at 815.599.3413 or the Financial Aid Office at 815.599.3519.

In previous years, the Foundation has annually awarded more than \$350,000 in scholarships to HCC students. Scholarships vary in amounts and are available for recent high school graduates, returning students, non-traditional students, part-time students, and adults seeking to reenter or attend college for the first time.

Since 1962, the Foundation has awarded more than \$6.8 million in scholarships through annually funded, endowed, and memorial scholarships. These scholarships have been established and sustained by generous donations from individuals and businesses in northwest Illinois.

Start Here. Go Anywhere. 3 Local Superintendents are Highland Alums!

he Superintendents of three northwest Illinois school districts have one thing in common—they are graduates of Highland Community College. Brad Albrecht, River-Ridge; Mike Schiffman, Freeport; and Rosemarie Brubaker, Aquin Catholic Schools each went on after Highland to advance their education and prepare for their current responsibilities.

Albrecht earned a Bachelor's degree from Illinois State University, then a Master's degree in Educational Administration from Clarke University. He earned his Superintendent's endorsement from Western Illinois University.

Schiffman earned a Bachelor's degree from Illinois State University and holds a Master's degree in Administration and Education from Western Illinois.

Brubaker earned her Bachelor's degree in Elementary Education from Rockford University and her Master's degree in Administration and Leadership from National Louis University.

All three superintendents spent their careers in education and have risen through the ranks. Albrecht started in the Elizabeth School District as a physical ed teacher and multi-sport coach. With the consolidation of Hanover and Elizabeth School districts—River Ridge—he continued teaching and was also head boys basketball coach and athletic director for the district. He was also principal for grades 6 – 12 prior to becoming superintendent in 2004.

Albrecht said, "Highland was a great experience and affordable decision after high school. I was unsure of my future plans, so I decided to enroll in general education courses and participate in basketball and baseball." He was captain of the Cougar basketball team.

Albrecht added that Highland "allowed me to stay in the area and have a quality education and college social life."

Schiffman began serving as Superintendent of Schools in the Freeport School District on July 1st, 2015. His previous experience included five years as Superintendent of Schools for Dakota Community Unit School District 201 in Dakota, IL, where he served beginning in July 2010. Prior to that, he spent time as a principal, dean of students, and history teacher at other school districts in northwest Illinois. He is currently working on and close to completing his Doctoral Degree through Western Illinois University, "hopefully" graduating in May or December of 2016.

Schiffman said, "HCC provided a great start to my post high school education. Going to HCC allowed me to find out what career and pathway I wanted to move towards. Dr. Kenneth Kiser was one of my Social Science professors at HCC, and it was after taking his courses that I realized I wanted to be a Social Science teacher."

"I was also responsible for paying for my college tuition," Schiffman said. "So by attending HCC I was able to continue to live at home and to work in the area in order to save for my tuition as I moved on to a four-year institution."

Schiffman noted that Highland Community College "is where my passion for life-long learning started. It was where many doors began to open for me and my future as a teacher and educational leader."

Brubaker taught in the Aquin Catholic School system beginning in 2008 as a teacher in several subjects—psychology, sociology, science, health and world history. She was junior/senior high school administrative intern and then administrator, before becoming Aquin superintendent and principal in 2015.

Aquin's Brubaker said, "Attending Highland Community College was an excellent choice for me and my family. I am a wife and mother of two who, at the time, was starting college at square one. I was a nontraditional student and needed an affordable start that was close to home. HCC was just that and more. I was impressed by the rigor of the courses and the knowledge of the professors. I felt pushed to work hard, critically think and openly discuss thoughts and ideas within the classroom."

Brubaker added, "Highland was a catalyst for me to continue on to complete my bachelor's degree and master's degree. All around my HCC education was top notch, but I would like to specifically mention the excellence I experienced with the English department.

"I truly feel as though they prepared me well for my future college and professional research, writing and public speaking. Professor Donna Tufariello was instrumental in increasing the quality of my writing. After being out of school for about eight years, she was patient as I learned to recall information I had not used in almost a decade. However, nothing but true excellence was acceptable. I thrived off of that type of challenge.

"I'd also like to commend Professor Alan Wenzel. I am a much better public speaker because of his guidance and expertise."

Highland Community College currently uses a promotional and recruiting slogan "Start Here. Go Anywhere." It's a pleasure to recognize these three local educational leaders who got their start at Highland and have come back to northwest Illinois!
